#### **School History**

#### Inspector's Observation Reports 1952 - 1969

The following is an extract from the Inspector's reports of the Infants' Department. It provides a very thorough indication of school life at The Entrance during this period.

The Entrance Infants' Dept. Inspection Aug 12, 14, 15, 18, 19, 1952

ORGANISATION:

Accommodation is now ample, but the grounds are in bad condition. However, plans for the improvement of the

grounds have been sanctioned. The buildings are being completely renovated.

More presses, which are urgently needed, have been applied for. Plans and specifications for a Staff Room and Office for the Mistress have been prepared.

Commendable efforts have been made to beautify the classroom, and further splendid plans have been forecasted. Gardening has been hampered because of lack of water, but some garden beds and many shrubs have been planted.

Considerable valuable work has been carried out with respect to pupil guidance and correct classification of pupils. The mistress who thoughtfully and effectively guides her assistants, tests thoroughly, and does considerable follow-up work. At Staff Meetings, which are held monthly, valuable discussions have been held with respect to the New Curriculum, and a good record of proceedings kept. Regular testing by teachers is on sound lines, with each keeping a

follow-up work.

It is pleasing to note the attention given to daily lesson preparation and to adequate use of the blackboard. Considerable new free material has been secured and it is used to advantage. Plans have been made for the purchase of more activity material in accordance with requirements for

The P. & C. Association is a helpful body. The Gould League and the School bank are well supported. Money was recently raised in aid of Stewart House and the Spastic Centre. Community relations are very happy.

The hearty co-operation of the Staff is a good feature.

#### **GOVERNMENT:**

the New Curriculum.

A very happy spirit prevails, the affection shown between teachers and pupils being a very pleasing feature. Control presents little difficulty because pupils are kept active and interested, are given special duties to train them in responsibility to one another and to their school. Another commendable feature is the courtesy and respect shown on all hands, with stress on spiritual values.

#### INSTRUCTION: General Survey.

Sincere efforts have been made to develop a realistic approach to the training of the little ones. To interest them in activity exercises, in useful projects, in dramatization, and, above all to instil a love of the good and beautiful, a sense of responsibility, of courtesy and respect, in short to make character training in the truest sense a most important issue. It is also gratifying to note the splendid work done in Speech training. All realise that much still remains to be done, but the effort shown is surely yielding valuable results.

Many new and suitable library books have been purchased, and there are undoubted signs of a happier and more effective approach to reading, with progress in formal work improving, although in some cases, sight work might be increased and further reality introduced in presentation of lessons. Efforts have been made to improve story-telling power by pupils, and it is realised that more stimulation is still needed. Splendid work has been done in Poetry and in Spelling, with guidance in Written Expression on very effective lines. The great happiness shown in dramatic work speaks volumes for the inspirational guidance of the teachers. The Writing in all books is of good quality, with neatness specially stressed.

In Mathematics, considerable progress in oral work has been made, with activity work growing. More real practical work in shopping transactions could be introduced. Measurement work is on very good lines; free material is used to advantage. Teachers strive earnestly to make the subject interesting.

Some life history work in nature Study has been attempted, but this could be increased. However, gardening interest has been aroused, and interest in flowers specially stressed.

The quality of projects undertaken in the Social Studies calls for commendation. The spirit of inquiry has been aroused, collections and sketches made, while the pupils delight in telling of their collections and discoveries. Scripture is splendidly taught, and there is a high spiritual tone throughout, with the Morning Assembly conducted on very good lines. Health training is another good feature.

In Music, special attention has been given to voice training and to introducing to the children many songs of good type which they render sweetly, with sufficient stress on suitable action songs. The School Choir and School Percussion Band are developing in a very pleasing manner. Musical Games and Rhythm are of good type and rendered happily and spiritedly.

Art and Handwork are of the right type, with activity the central 'note', with pupils given the opportunity to display any originality they possess.

Physical Training, which is in accordance with the New Curriculum, has aroused interest and activity. 20/8/52

#### **Preschool Enrolments for 2016**

If you have a child who will be turning four years old before the 31st July 2016 and you would like to enrol them in our preschool for next year, please collect an application form from the front office. There are only 40 places available. The preschool currently operates two groups; one operating every Monday and Tuesday and alternate Wednesdays, the other operating Thursdays and Fridays and the alternate Wednesdays.

Priority must go to children who live in The Entrance Public School area and will be attending kindergarten at The Entrance Public School in 2017. Preference must also be given to students who have a disability, come from a low socio-economic family situation and/or are of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander descent. A birth certificate is also required for proof of age.

The Garawa Pre-school is run by the Department of Education and Communities and fees have been heavily subsidised to cater for the needs of our community. This year the full fee rate per day is \$15 per day. If the family has a Health Care card or are Aboriginal, fee relief is applied and the cost is reduced to \$7.00 per day. To date fees have not been given to us for 2016.

We are currently making plans for our Kindergarten Transition to School program for students starting in 2015, which continued today, **Wednesday 28<sup>th</sup> October 2-3pm.** If you have a child or know of a child that may be starting at The Entrance Public School in 2016 could you please advise the office to assist us with planning for the transition program and enrolment at the best school on the Central Coast.

and keep their homework safe.


#### Mrs Bayfield on Leave

#### **Google Expeditions**

Expeditions is a virtual reality platform built for the classroom. Expeditions are guided tours of places school buses can't go. They are comprised of virtual reality panoramas and are led by a guide or teacher.

Using a tablet, teachers can guide up to 50 students wearing virtual reality viewers. Teachers can guide their class and point out highlights while referring to editable notes. We were so very lucky to have Google come to our school and test out the program with our students. The kids had a fantastic experience. Thank you to Mrs Tolman for arranging this opportunity.

#### **Teamwork**

The ability to work together with others as part of a team is not simply a skill needed at school, it is a vital skill used in all areas of life. School is, however, an excellent time to cultivate the teamwork ethos your child will then draw from throughout their life.

It has been great to see many of our Stage 3 students attend Swim School for 2015 in weeks three and four of this term. Swim School combined with Sun, Surf & Sand help to ensure that our kids have maximum skills when it comes to ability and

safety near water.

We live in an idealic location that many of us take for granted on a daily basis. One of the potential hazards is children who cannot swim being so exposed to water. Every year many child die from accidental drowning. Thank you for your support in helping us equip our students to be safe and able in this respect.

#### **AVID at TEPS**

On Friday Stage 3 classrooms were visited by two Victorian University leaders of AVID Australia. Both of the ladies were **COMPLETELY BLOWN AWAY** by the work that is happening in Stage 3 classroom. This year has been the first year of implementing AVID in Stage 3 and it has been an unequalled success. Students have developed greater organising skills, become educated and more aware about their personal mindsets and have learnt greater strategies to engage with others about their learning.

To support greater levels of collaborative learning in classrooms, each Stage 3 classroom has just been recently refurbished with 'plectrum' tables, new ergonomic chairs and collaborative whiteboards. Each Stage 3 teacher has now been trained in AVID and next year will be an exciting year as we 'go deeper' in our learning journeys.



#### 2016 Year 6 School Shirts

Each Year 5 student has been given an order form for their 2016 Year 6 shirt. These shirts are ordered this year so that in the first week back students will receive their shirts. This shirt is the official school uniform for all Year 6 students. Once payment is received we can order your shirt. #### Stage 3 Awards

This term will see Stage 3 launch five new awards that students can aspire to achieve. #### STUDENT WELLBEING

A little over twelve months ago we began a journey as a school to build upon the great things that are happening at TEPS. Part of that journey was increasing student engagement, building systems within our school that supported teachers and students and increased the capacity for students to learn and achieve great things.

In that time, we have increased focus on school uniform and student attendance, instituted fortnightly whole school assemblies, set up Planning Rooms for both K-2 and Years 3-6, designed behavioural expectations for each learning setting and have begun ensuring that clear and constant standards of behaviour are communicated and expected right across our school. Our new school wide 'Onward & Upward' program has had phase one implemented and this has helped to acknowledge and reward those students who consistently exhibit our core values of respect, responsibility and personal best.

As part of this ongoing process Planning Room from next week will operate both at recess and at lunchtime. Planning Room will now also cater for students with poor classroom behaviour in addition to targeting negative playground behaviour.

Students who exhibit serious poor behaviour, either in the classroom or playground, will be sent to the next session of Planning Room and will remain there until the behaviours are addressed and teachers feel that students have understood and made a commitment to grow beyond the negative behaviours that they are exhibiting. Students will not be permitted either back into the classroom or back onto the playground until their behaviour has been adequately addressed.

#### Classroom Behaviour

High expectations are the key to student success and each teacher at TEPS has high expectations for each of the students in their classroom in terms of both their learning and behaviour. Each teacher uses a visible warning followed by three strikes system in class to help students become aware of their negative behaviours. Once a student has received three strikes they are removed from the learning space and are sent to their supervising Assistant Principal.

For serious negative classroom behaviours, Assistant Principals will issue a yellow note to parents/caregivers to inform them of their child's behaviour. A child who receives three yellow notes within a semester will receive a warning of suspension. If students persist in engaging in these behaviours they will be suspended. Please note: students may receive a warning of suspension or a suspension straight up if the incident is worthy of one. Learning is the goal and our school has a serious commitment to each student being able to learn as much as they can within the classroom to achieve their maximum personal potential. Disobedience, insolence, absconding, offensive language and disruptive behaviours will not be tolerated-they rob each of us of the ability to teach and learn.

#### **Playground Behaviour**

With almost 600 students in the playground at recess and lunch cooperative playground behaviour is essential. Students who exhibit dangerous or anti-social behaviour will be removed from the playground. Students who exhibit negative behaviour in the playground have their behaviour documented and monitored for a week or if deemed serious enough are sent to the Planning Room to address the behaviour.

For serious playground behaviours, Assistant Principals will issue a green note to parents/caregivers to inform them of their child's behaviour. Any child who receives three green notes within a semester will receive a warning of suspension. And once again, if behaviour does not change a suspension will follow. Please note: students may receive a warning of suspension or a suspension straight up if the incident is worthy of one. Physical violence, offensive language, threatening others and intimidation will not be tolerated within our school community.

We have seen a great improvement in student behaviour, particularly in the playground over the last twelve months (negative playground incidents have dropped by over 200) and these clear expectations and consequences will further help to build the positive community spirit here at TEPS. With teachers, parents/caregiver and students working closely together we will no doubt continue to build a great school.


